LATIN COURSE RECOMMENDATION

Those who have been reading The Issachar File for any length of time probably now have an increased appreciation for reading and studying--disciplines which strengthen one's spiritual life as well as mental capabilities. One of the best studies to embark upon to enhance reading skills and enjoyment is that of Latin.

Most Latin textbooks are secular and use stories about mythology or military conquests and life in the Roman Empire in all its "glory," gore, and ungodliness. However, my family has discovered a treasure that makes the study of Latin a rich devotional time. It is a course called Biblia Sacra, by Scott Bayer, Ph.D., and Elisabeth Furbush, Ph.D., and it is based on the Vulgate. (The Vulgate is a Latin translation of the Scriptures done by the scholar Jerome in the seventh century in order to make the Scriptures available to the common people. Because the Vulgate and the King James Version were both translated from the original Greek and Hebrew, the two correspond closely.)

The course's self-study format is excellent for home schoolers (or for anyone else). It includes a set of instructional tapes and a beautiful workbook with engravings and woodblock prints from the Middle Ages, which set the tone for the study of the Bible and the Latin language. Younger students can color the pictures while reviewing the vocabulary with the tapes. A delightful feature of the tapes is the worshipful music of J. S. Bach, which plays in the background as the instructor speaks. The music facilitates the learning process and enhances memorization.

Biblia Sacra is eventually to be a four-part series, and Level I is available There are vocabulary drills, matching and translation exercises, exploration of English derivatives of Latin words, crossword puzzles, and other enjoyable activities that are very effective in helping the student to master the material as well as to gain insights into the life, death, and resurrection of Christ.
